Understanding Lymphedema

Lymphedema (LIMF-eh-DEE-ma) is the buildup of lymph fluid in your body's tissues that can happen when lymph nodes are removed or damaged. Lymphedema can cause swelling anywhere in the body, but most often happens in the arms and/or legs. Lymphedema results from common cancer treatments such as surgery and

Lymphedema (Swelling of the Arm) If you had breast cancer surgery some of your lymph nodes under your arm may have been removed to check for cancer. When lymph nodes are removed during breast surgery or are treated with radiation therapy, some of the lymph vessels can become blocked. This increases the chance for lymphedema.

Lymphedema Damage and/or blockage of lymph flow, which causes accumulation of high-protein edema Skin thickened, becomes firm and fibrosed, lymphangitis and cellulitis common Ulceration not common May be congenital; may be sudden on-set, otherwise may be gradual increase in edema over months or years, pitting if recent onset, indurated and

Bioimpedance for Lymphedema Assessment

lymphedema (relative arm volume difference of $>10\%$ by VD \pm abnormal L-Dex) Change in L-Dex was plotted against change in VD; correlation was assessed using the Pearson correlation At a median follow-up of 182 months, 152 patients were normal, 25 had an abnormal L-Dex, and 9 developed lymphedema without a prior L-Dex abnormality
