Sutton Hoo Clue Cards - Thinking History

This excavation took place over 70 years ago, in 1939 There was a large mound close to the River Deben at a place called Sutton Hoo in Suffolk The archaeologists dug a long trench into the mound Clue A showed you a picture inside the trench The soil in the trench was a different colour from the surrounding soil because it contained rotted wood

Moulding the Impression of the Sutton Hoo Ship

Moulding the impression of the Sutton Hoo ship 181 Vertical measurements were then taken from the cross-pieces to the bottom section of the mould The 5 x 5 cm timber was cut 2-5 cm short of the measurements and nailed to the cross-pieces These were then replaced in their sockets and the vertical pieces placed on
