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Albert Bandura Social Learning Theory

In social learning theory, Albert Bandura (1977) agrees with the behaviorist learning theories of classical conditioning and operant conditioning. However, he adds two important ideas: Mediating processes occur between stimuli & responses.

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Behavior is learned from the environment through the process of observational learning.

A psychologist named Albert Bandura proposed a social learning theory which suggests that observation and modeling play a primary role in this process. Bandura's theory moves beyond behavioral theories, which suggest that all behaviors are learned through conditioning, and cognitive theories, which take into account psychological influences such as attention and memory.

How Albert Bandura's Social Learning Theory Works

The social learning theory is a theory developed by Dr. Albert Bandura in the 1960's. It is a behavioral theory that challenges previous theories of behavioral psychology. These previous

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theories maintained that reinforcement and punishment were the motivators for behavior.
